LETTER FROM THE BOARD CHAIR



In the year following completion of Wilks Place in Courtenay, the expectation was that the efforts of Habitat Vancouver Island North would quickly turn to planning and fundraising for a similar development in Campbell River. And while early stage work did commence, several challenges emerged requiring time and attention in order to sustain our mission of service to providing affordable homeownership.

The property housing our Campbell River ReStore operations was placed on the market in 2024, which after careful analysis and consideration a decision was taken to purchase the property in order to preserve a critical source of funds that contributes to our ability to serve families on the North Island.

Management and the Board are grateful for the many considerations offered by our former Landlord, as well as the generous contributions of the Community to a hastily arranged and targeted fundraising campaign for the down payment.

As with many retailers across the country, ReStore performance across the Habitat Federation also faced many challenges impacting revenues and profit in 2024. Thanks to the resilience and commitment to success, our ReStores in Campbell River and Courtenay addressed those same challenges throughout the year and produced sales results very similar to the past two years. This accomplishment doesn't happen without the focus and efforts of our ReStore Staff and volunteers, together with local leadership, and of equal import the continued generous support of the communities we serve through their customer visits and donations.

Habitat Vancouver Island North also served two families in '24 from our current stock of homes, an achievement we are always proud of in terms of delivering safe and affordable homeownership.

We are only able to serve our communities through the support and generosity of many - national sponsors who provide quality product for sale in our ReStores, the residents of the communities that directly support our ReStores relative to donations and purchases, and the ongoing support of all levels of government - CMHC, BC Housing, the municipalities we serve: Campbell River, Courtenay, Comox, Cumberland, and the CVRD, every sponsor, private donor, Habitat staff, and our critically important volunteers.

I also extend my thanks and appreciation to the Habitat (VIN) Board for their service and stewardship as the organization works through both the challenges and opportunities presented in our work to serve families.

Celebrating Two Decades of Impact on Vancouver Island North (2004 – 2024)



In 2024, Habitat for Humanity Vancouver Island North celebrated a major milestone: 20 years of helping local families build strength, stability, and self-reliance through affordable homeownership.

Since 2004, we've built 51 homes, supported 56 families, and created countless moments of connection and purpose, on build sites, in ReStores, and at kitchen tables where hope took root. This anniversary was more than a celebration of what we've done, it was a recommitment to what's ahead.

Reflections & Recognition

A Community Milestone

On October 7, 2024, local mayors proclaimed the date Habitat for Humanity Day, coinciding with World Habitat Day. The cities of Campbell River and Courtenay recognized the lasting impact Habitat has had on housing and community resilience across the region.

TIMELINE HISTORY

2004 - Our First Home Build



Longtime volunteer, Jon Toogood helped organize 200+ volunteers and built the first home - a duplex on Willemar Avenue in Courtenay.

2014 - First Multi-Home Build



Through the help of generous donations and hard work from volunteers, our first multifamily build on Piercy Avenue was completed in April, 2014.

2005/7 - Habitat ReStores Open



A crucial funding source for all of our home builds on the north island, the first ReStore in Courtenay, opened its doors in March, 2005. The Campbell River ReStore followed in 2007.

2018 - Jim's Legacy



In 2018, we received the largest personal donation in our history from the estate of James Wilks. His contribution played a pivotal role in the building of Wilks Place, a townhouse complex on Piercy Avenue completed in 2024.

2009 - 1st Build in Campbell River



With land generously donated by the city, our first build in Campbell River was completed in 2009; marking our expansion into Campbell River.

2024 - Twenty Year Anniversary



In recognition of 20 years, 51 homes built and 56 families served, Courtenay and Campbell River Mayors proclaimed Oct. 7, 2024 as Habitat for Humanity (VIN) Day!

Looking Ahead

Our first 20 years laid a strong foundation. The next 20 will be about expanding impact: more homes, stronger partnerships, and greater inclusion.

As we move forward, we do so with the same conviction that started it all: everyone deserves a safe, decent place to live.

Together, we've built more than homes - we've built a movement.



Anniversary Celebration at ReStores

In October 2024, Habitat for Humanity Vancouver Island North celebrated 20 years of building homes, hope, and community with events at both of our ReStore locations. The anniversary gatherings brought together homeowners, volunteers, staff, and supporters to honour two decades of impact. A highlight was a moving testimonial from a Habitat homeowner who shared how affordable homeownership transformed her family's life, bringing stability and a sense of belonging. We also recognized long-time volunteers whose dedication has been vital to our mission, and guests contributed to a collaborative art canvas, creating a vibrant symbol of community and shared purpose. With 51 homes built and 56 families served since 2004, the celebrations reflected on our achievements and renewed our commitment to building a brighter future together.

The Upcycle Challenge and volunteer-led refreshes not only promote reuse - we're seeing the ReStores become community touch points, where creativity, connection, and environmental care converge to fund our mission.

Shopping with Purpose: ReStore Community Events in 2024

Our ReStores don't just offer great deals, they offer connection. In 2024, our Courtenay and Campbell River locations hosted a series of recurring and seasonal events designed to bring people together, raise awareness of our mission, and foster a culture of reuse with heart.

ReStore Coffee Days

On select Thursdays throughout 2024, both locations offered complimentary coffee and snacks to customers and volunteers. These casual gatherings encouraged conversation, built relationships, and created a welcoming, community-centred environment.

- · Hosted monthly during spring and fall
- · Created opportunities to meet staff, learn about volunteering, or simply feel at home while shopping
- Supported customer return visits and ReStore loyalty

Senior Discount Days

Every Wednesday, seniors received 15% off storewide, helping create accessible options for those on fixed incomes while driving midweek foot traffic.

- 2024 participation increased following targeted in-store and social promotions
- Helped ReStores serve as a resource for affordable goods and social interaction for older adults
- · Many seniors brought donations with them, reinforcing the ReStore's circular model

Customer Appreciation Events

- In early June 2024, Habitat for Humanity VIN hosted its first-ever Customer Appreciation Days at both the Courtenay and Campbell River ReStores.
- Customers were invited to enjoy light refreshments, engage with ReStore staff and volunteers, and take advantage of special shopping offers. These events aimed to say "thank you" for their support, celebrate the community, and highlight the mission behind their purchases.

Themed Sale Events & Givebacks Special ReStore days in 2024 included:

- Valentine's Day Customer Appreciation Sale: 20% off home décor and lighting
- Earth Day "Buy Green" Feature: Highlighted sustainable and upcycled goods
- Customer Contest Giveaways: Store credit prizes during holiday promos
- ReMarkables Online Auction: Monthly auction for one-of-a-kind items raised \$21,768

Together, these grassroots events helped make the ReStore not just a store but a community space with purpose.

Community Volunteering





Hosted a few ReStore Refresh events at the Comox Valley location. Twenty-one volunteers, including partner families, revitalized the store with painting, repairs, and cleaning, logging 141 volunteer-hours.

Welcomed Katimavik students as volunteers. As they built practical skills, the young volunteers transformed donated items into more interesting and desirable pieces for resale.

Welcomed **200 volunteers**, who logged a total of **23,455 hours** at the ReStores.

Grassroots Giving & Community-Led Impact

In 2024, dozens of individuals and small businesses stepped up in creative, heartfelt ways to support affordable housing in the Comox Valley and Campbell River. From bake sales to in-kind donations and workplace giving, these acts of generosity helped us build more than homes, they helped build momentum.

Community-led fundraising is more than a financial boost - it builds connection. These efforts expand our supporter base, grow awareness, and demonstrate the collective power of small actions.

- RE/MAX Check Realty Campbell River-opoly (\$5690)
- Queneesh School fundraisers (\$1200)
- St. George's Annual Christmas Cookie Walk
- Strathcona Sunrise Rotary SkyRocket compost sale (\$2780)
- Scotia Bank employees in Courtenay fundraised and donated around \$1200 for their jeans day initiative in 2024

These peer-to-peer fundraisers raised over \$10,000 collectively, and spread our message to hundreds of new community members.

In-Kind Goods & Services

Our builds and ReStores benefited greatly from in-kind donations throughout the year. These unsung heroes make a lasting impact on our community by contributing what they have and what they know. This not only allows us to build more homes, it's also a great way for companies to bring their teams together in a meaningful way, encourage engagement, and provide rewarding opportunities for value added activities in the workplace.

- Received \$60,477 in Gifts-in-Kind in 2024
- Local tradespeople donated time and tools for our Piercy Avenue site
- Coastal Community Credit Union our trusted partner in banking, providing construction financing, day to day banking and lending for Habitat, and homeowner mortgages
- Businesses like hardware stores, paint suppliers, and appliance retailers contributed gently used or surplus inventory.
- Home Depot Campbell River In 2024 Home Depot partnered with us for two impactful volunteer days that helped improve our ReStore's exterior space. During the first build day, Home Depot employees constructed beautiful flower boxes for the front of the store, adding a warm and welcoming touch. On the second day, volunteers built a much-needed lean-to in the side yard to help keep stock dry and protected from the elements. While all the labour was donated by enthusiastic Home Depot volunteers, the materials for the lean-to were generously provided by Home Depot, showcasing their commitment to giving back and supporting our community spaces

MEANING OF HOME



This annual national contest invites students in Grades 4–6 to reflect on what home means to them. Every submission generates a \$10 donation from sponsor Sagen $^{\text{TM}}$ to the student's local Habitat.

274 submitted entries STUDENTS in 2024 and raised \$2740 towards affordable housing.

IMPACT

TEAM BUILDS

Twice in 2024, employees from our national partner, Urban Systems, rolled up their sleeves and joined us on the Habitat build site, lending their time and talents to paint, landscape, build fences, and more. These hands-on team builds not only help move our projects forward, they also deepen the connection between volunteers and the mission. Each build day includes a special visit from a Habitat homeowner, who shares how affordable homeownership has transformed their life. In addition to volunteering, Urban Systems generously donated \$10,000 for each Team Build to support our work, making a lasting impact in our community.





Local partners like MNP, Scotiabank, and First Credit Union participated in mini team builds and community impact days at our ReStores and build sites. Each event included an introduction to our work and a Habitat homeowner sharing their story.

Together, these teams raised \$6,500 in support of our mission.

BIDtoBUILD AUCTION

Our fourth annual online auction brought together over 150 donated items from local businesses—including flights, gift cards, and curated experiences. Early registrants had a chance to win passes to Vancouver Island MusicFest, and community momentum helped drive another successful fundraiser.

- Sponsors: Brando Construction returned as lead sponsor, with Tyee Chevrolet Buick GMC offering "buy-it-now" prize packages.
- Impact: Raised \$31,000. Proceeds supported ongoing construction at 461 Hilchey Road (Campbell River) and the new 12-unit development at 1375 Piercy Avenue (Courtenay).

COMMUNITY FOCUSED FUNDRAISING

Other fundraising initiatives focused on community engagement and outreach. Through our participation in events like Canada Day, where we invited 6 local "celebs" to dodge water balloons for our cause, we raised over \$32,000 in 2024.

This included our participation at the Homes in One Golf Tournament (in partnership with Habitat Mid-Vancouver Island), BatFest, as well as 50-50 Raffle sales during those events.

Our final push of the year, the Annual Matching Campaign, was once again supported by Christoph Real Estate. In total, community members contributed over \$44,000 to Habitat VIN through both one-time and monthly donations.

Every conversation helps us shift perspectives

– from seeing affordable housing as charity,
to recognizing it as a partnership that builds
stronger communities.

Our presence at community events helped:

- Recruit new volunteers and donors
- Educate the public about our builds and how families qualify
- Gather contact information for future outreach
- Increase ReStore foot traffic and material donations









Community Outreach: Meeting People Where They Are

In 2024, Habitat for Humanity Vancouver Island North prioritized being present, not only on build sites, but in the heart of the community. Through pop-up booths, public education efforts, and ReStore-hosted information days, we expanded awareness of our mission and connected face-to-face with hundreds of local residents.

25 community 3,000+ attendees engaged 600+ students reached

Throughout 2024, Habitat VIN representatives and volunteers participated in 25 community events across the Comox Valley and Campbell River, including:

- Campbell River Volunteer Fair (April 2024) Hosted a booth to recruit new build site and ReStore volunteers.
- Comox Valley Fall Home Show (October 2024) Promoted ReStore services and upcycling programs while sharing how affordable homeownership changes lives.
- Farmers' Markets & Festivals Set up mobile booths at several seasonal markets to answer questions about homeownership, volunteer opportunities, and donations.
- We delivered six community presentations, Habitat 101 sessions, at local churches, civic groups, and businesses, including the Rotary Club and Altrusa. These sessions focused on the growing need for affordable housing, how the Habitat model works, and the many ways individuals and organizations can get involved.
- 2 volunteer info sessions held at each ReStore, attended by over 40 prospective volunteers.
- Reel Impact Contest, invited students in grades 9–12 to create short video "reels" showcasing how Habitat VIN is making a difference in the community. The objective was to elevate engaging storytelling and inspire social impact through youth creativity. Sponsored by First Credit Union.



In February, homeowners and volunteers wrote "love letters" to the community as a way to thank donors, sponsors, and supporters for making safe, affordable housing possible. These heartfelt messages were displayed in our ReStores and in all Coastal Community Credit Union branches in Campbell River, Courtenay, and Comox. The campaign sparked meaningful conversations, strengthened community connections, and inspired continued support by putting real voices and stories at the heart of the mission.



Powered by People:

At Habitat VIN, volunteers are more than helpers – they're builders of homes, trust, and lasting community. In 2024, volunteers contributed over 28,000 hours across build sites, ReStores, and events. Below are a few of the people who gave their time, talent, and heart this year.

"My sister, Paula and I often say that if we got fifty cents for every time we have asked ourselves how we got so lucky to have seen an ad for the Habitat Women Build in 2012, we would be rich. The first build was a 6 unit project in Courtenay. We did everything from raking gravel and straightening nails for reuse to painting, siding, insulating, dry-walling, cabinet assembly, etc. Some patient supervisor took the time to show us how to do these jobs. The new homeowners worked right beside us and it was nice to meet them and hear their stories. We never had to do anything we were uncomfortable with and were told never to go up on the roof (like we were ever planning to do that anyway)."

When we partner with families, we offer more than a safe place to call their own. We offer the opportunity to build financial stability, confidence, self-reliance and community. In 2024, Habitat for Humanity Vancouver Island North continued to support homeowner families through hands-on construction, educational workshops, and community connection. We were also able to help two new partner families finally achieve their dream of home ownership and meet the request of an existing partner family for more space for their growing family.





With the help of their extended family and friends, our partner families contribute 500 volunteer hours, assisting tradespeople at build sites, working alongside volunteers in our ReStores, and engaging with our local communities at Habitat VIN events. Each home is purchased via our signature dualmortgage process, with mortgage payments geared to fit our homeowner's ability to pay, ensuring long-term affordability and a path to intergenerational security.

Homeownership Impact in 2024



The Buy Back Program plays a vital role in preserving affordable housing in our communities. When families are ready to move on, their homes don't leave the Habitat VIN affordable housing inventory. Instead we reacquire, refurbish and resell these homes to new partner families, ensuring these homes continue to serve their original purpose.

In 2024, thanks to this program, Habitat VIN was proud to welcome two new families into safe, affordable homes that had been thoughtfully refurbished and made ready for new beginnings. At the same time, the Buy Back program provides partner families an opportunity to use their earned equity in order to transition into homes that better meet their changing needs - often larger spaces or single family homes - demonstrating the lasting financial stability that affordable homeownership can offer.

The program also helped us respond to a unique request from a current homeowner who wished to stay within the Habitat community but needed a larger home to accommodate their growing family. By supporting transitions like these, the Buy Back Program helps us deepen our commitment to long-term partnership and amplify the impact of every Habitat home - one family, and one future, at a time.

It wasn't just about getting a house," he explains, "It was about building a future for my kids, showing them that no matter how tough things get, you never stop trying.

VOLUNTEERING THEIR WAY HOME

PARTNERING WITH HABITAT HOMEOWNERS

The key ceremony brought together local community representatives along with other supporters, Habitat VIN volunteers, staff and donors, all sharing in some heartfelt words to welcome the families home.

Experiencing the community come together in such a way is very special to Habitat. It symbolizes the dedication to the cause of affordable housing and community development that Habitat for Humanity has helped create for 20 years on Vancouver Island North.

Our Family Services team works to help the families build their confidence as homeowners by being a "go to" resource for basically anything Habitat VIN related, while at the same time, providing continuing education about budgeting, home maintenance and legal & financial issues related to home ownership. Guiding new partner families through the partnership and home buying process, as well as being a safe and supportive point of contact for the entirety of a homeowner's time with Habitat VIN, helps our families become confident in their transition from tenant to homeowner and builds a sense of independence and self reliance that may have been previously unattainable.







With the help of volunteers and Habitat homeowners, Habitat for Humanity builds safe, decent, and affordable homes. Habitat VIN has brought the community together to build 51 affordable homes on North Vancouver Island since its founding in 2004. Because of families who eventually sold their homes back to Habitat after an improved financial situation, we have served a total of 56 homeowner families. Habitat does not give away free homes – the families who partner with us pay an affordable mortgage geared to their income and volunteer 500 hours with our organization. As Habitat homeowners pay off their mortgage, the funds are reinvested into a revolving fund, which we then use to build more homes for more families in the community. Our model of affordable homeownership bridges a gap for low-income working families by providing them with the opportunity to purchase their own Habitat homes and build a better future for their families.
